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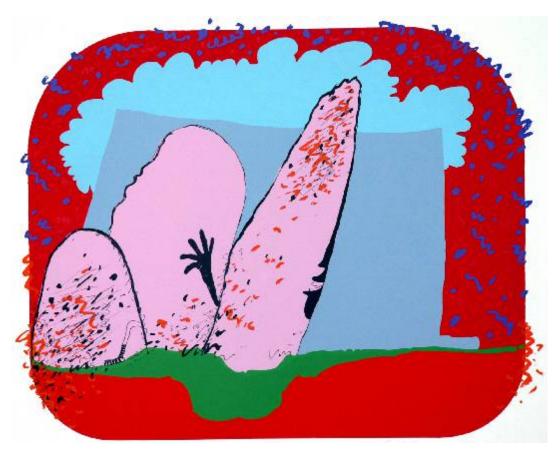

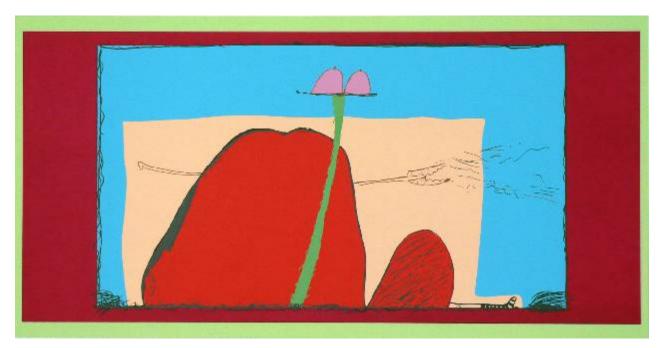
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(above) **Scrambled Hash** - 1974 Serigraph on paper, 20.5x26.5 inches, Ed. 45

David Samila The Wiser

"The Wiser" is an exhibition at Headbones Gallery of selected drawings on paper by David Samila. "Older but none the wiser" can be challenged. Samila's "Wiser" falls between jester and sage - and not to forget the expression "wise guy" an attitude looking forward to a good laugh. Samila cuts loose from formality to bring levity to the page. Water color and collage float with humorous abandon resulting in a quirky aesthetic balance.

The echelon of fine art has been known as "serious" (the male thrust of abstract expressionism for instance - *very serious*). There were certain visual tropes, regions, embellishments and modes that



Salimander - 1967 Acrylic, canvas, shaped plywood, 48x48 inches

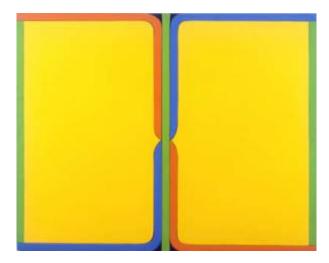


Winneco - 1970 Acrylic, canvas, shaped plywood, 48x60 inches

could not be considered. If they were considered, art might look silly and it was important to reinforce the fact that abstraction was NOT something that your child could do just as well. The use of pink, for instance was anathema unless it was used – as with DeKooning's angry tirades against the feminine sex, oft expressed with the soft, fleshy vulnerable colour – in service to more violent, serious feelings.

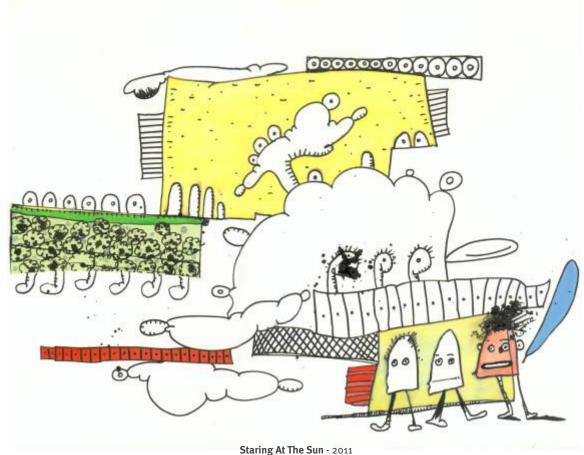
David Samila took another stance. His early abstracts seem to wave a finger at protectionist convention. He seemed to be advocating – heaven forbid! – fun.

Coming out of the era in the 6o's between minimalism and pop, David Samila's earlier works were built upon similar conversations being had by Ellesworth Kelly and Frank Stella. In the abstract, hard edge piece, *Ramsis* a middle vertical striping meets with a small blip – a curvaceous dip or pimple that feels almost decorative. "Decorative" was an adjective that was not welcomed when explaining *serious* art. Samila seems to ask – why not? *Ramsis* answers with assurance - no further need for advocacy – for there is a simple dignity to this piece while still retaining an endearing quality as if the two ochre rectangles are touching noses. In fact, these



are actually two shaped canvases meeting.

Pop also suffered a similar contumely. Clement Greenburg sought to place this now very pertinent movement into a lesser position asserting that Pop Art was not *serious*. In Samila's *Salimandar*, the shapes of an abstract composition are outlined like a cartoon and a wavy line dividing magenta from orange brings to mind a curtain about to open creating humour as if the show is about to begin. Scrambled Hash goes another step further, introducing a cartoonish hand waving from between abstract shapes. A profile seems wedged between

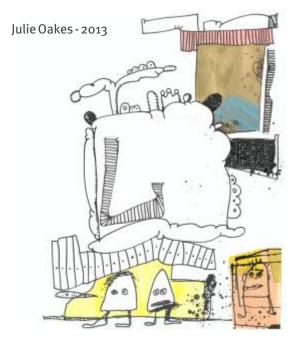


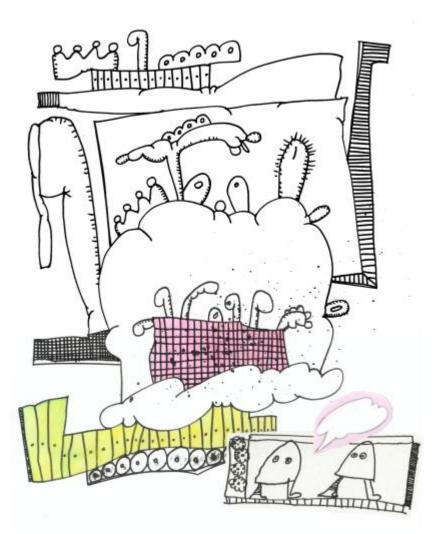
layers of free forms and even the title is off-center.

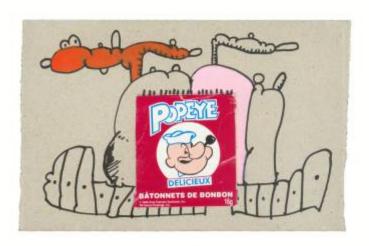
The "wisdom" of the recent works comes forty years hence. It is no surprise that the mature David Samila exercises this irreverent stature with an even freer hand, blowing caution to the wind and without disguise – having fun. In front of a backdrop of bouncing billows of squirts and nipples, caricatures parade and goof about. As if comfortable in clichés

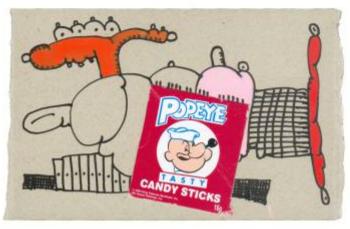
or clubs, couples, threesomes or "just friends"; these characters go about their business – no heavily nuanced "work" here - with oblivious happiness as if enjoying leisure time.

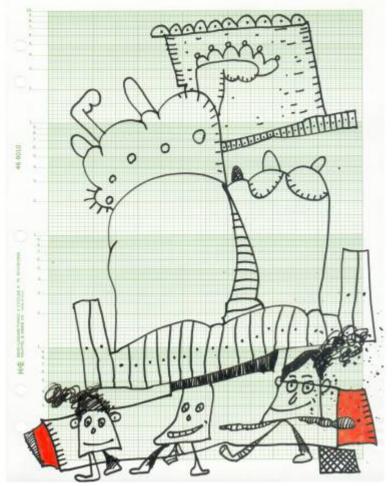
Samila's recent work inspires a lightness of being — his actual persona does as well. David Samila brings a breath of fresh air into an oft jaded art arena.

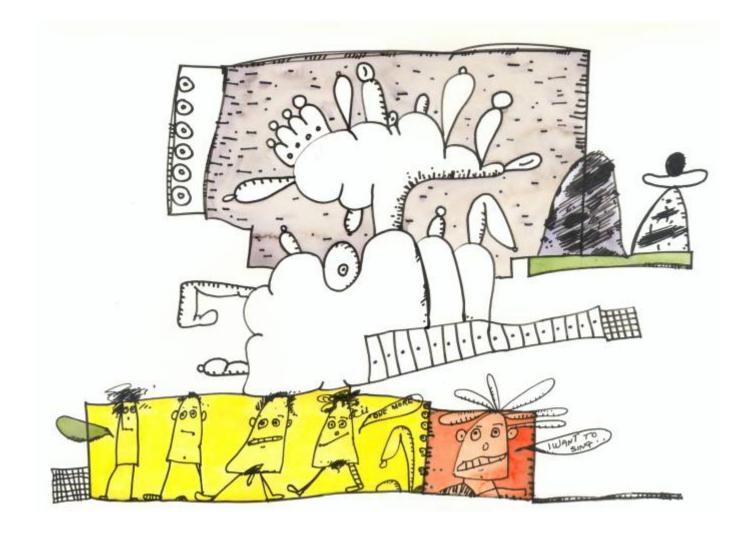


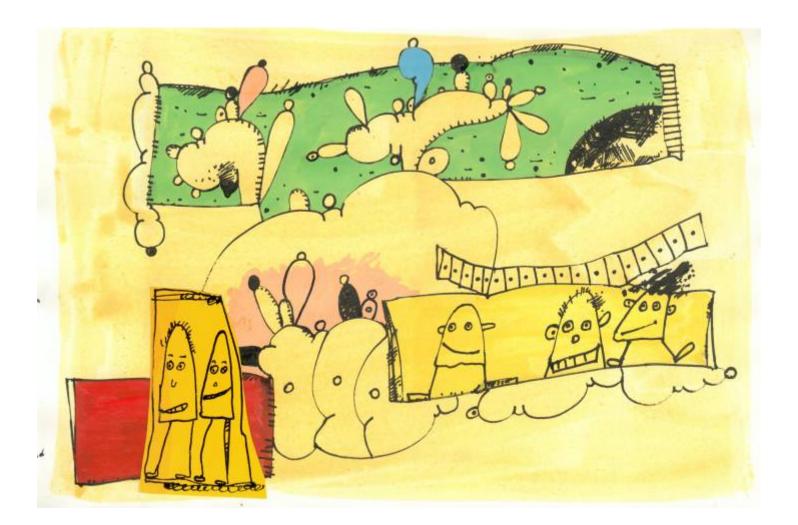






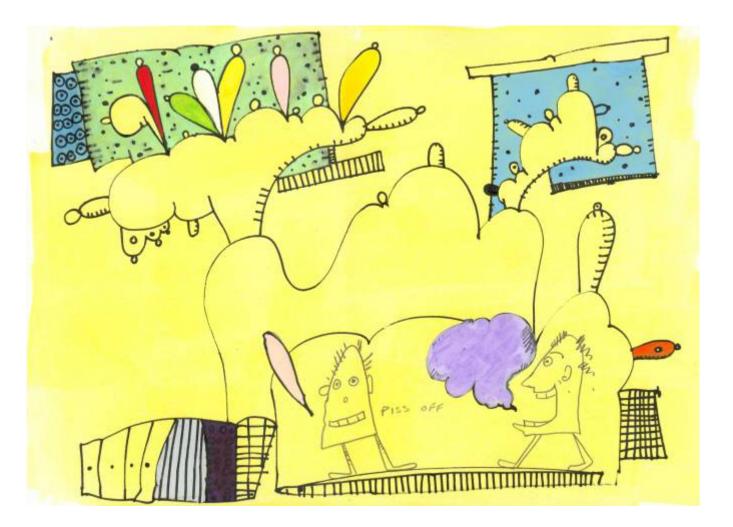


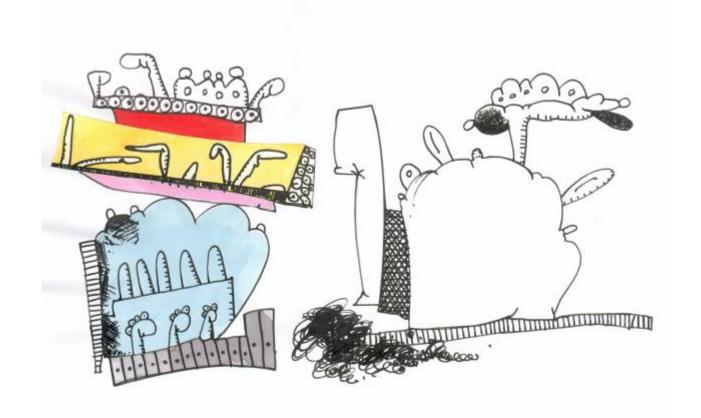


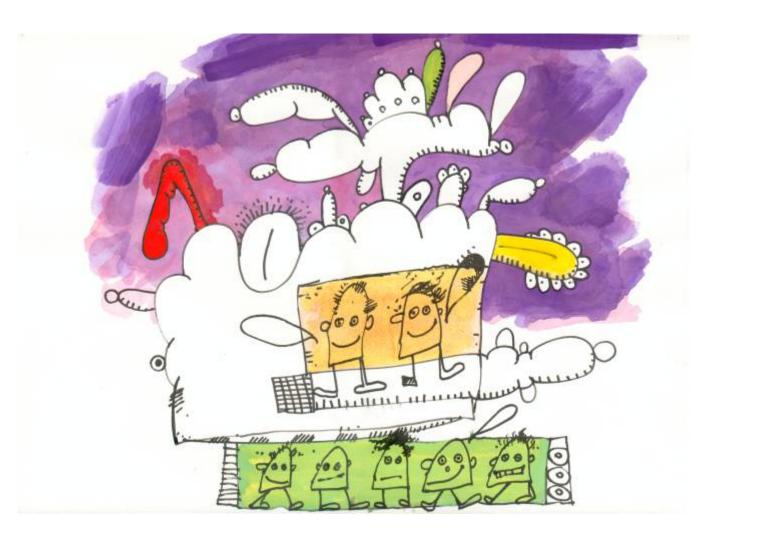


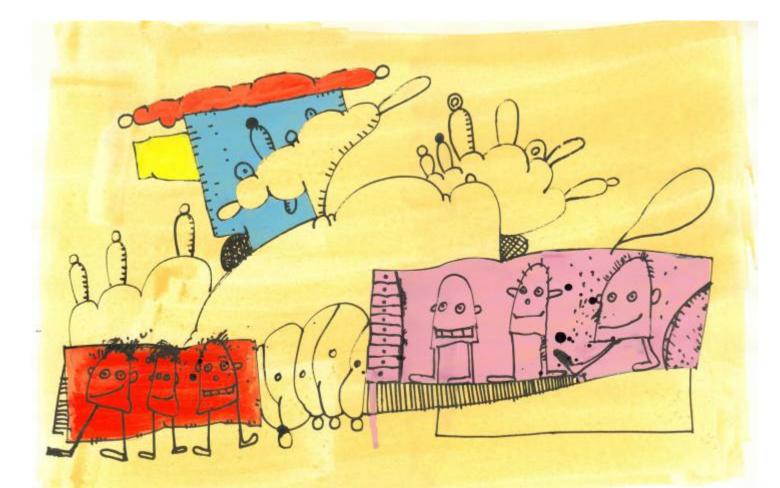


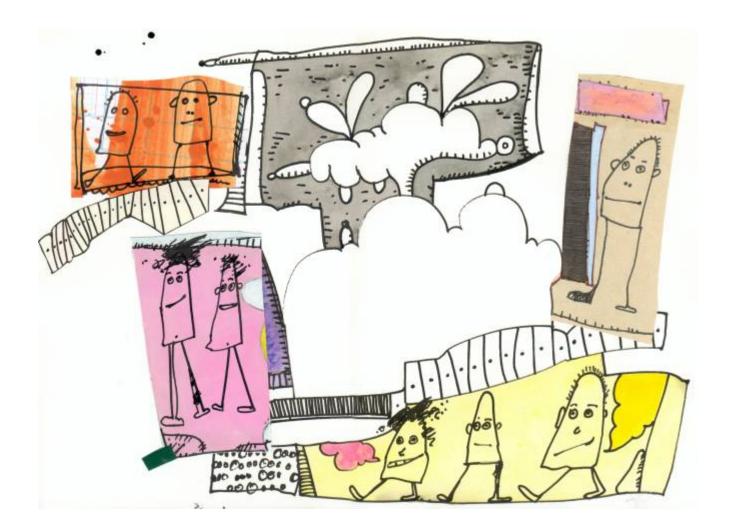
